An Act for Providing a Publick Reward for such Perfon or Persons as shall Discover the Longitude at Sea.



hereas it is well known by all that are acquainted with the Art of Mavigation, That nothing is so much wanted and delired at Sea, as the Discovery of the Longitude, for the Safety and Anickness of Advages, the Preferbation of Ships and the Lives of Pen: And whereas in the Judgment of Able Wathematicians and Mavigators, several Pethods have already been Discovered, true in Theory, though very Discovered, true in Theory, though very Discovered in Pradice,

And for a due and fufficient Encouragement to any fuch Perfon or Perlong ag hall Discover a proper Method for Finding the faid Longitude, Be it Enaded by the Authority aforefaid, Chat the firft Author of Authors, Diftoberer of Difcoberers of anp fuch Wethod, bis of their Executors, Abminificators, of Allgng, hall be Entitled to, and babe fuch Reward as berein after is mentioned ; Chat is to fay, Co a Reward, og Sum of Cen thoufand Pounds, if it Determines the faid Longitude to One Degree of a great Circle, or Sirty Geographical Wiles: to Fifteen thousand Dounds, if it Determines the fame to Emo Chiros of that Diffance; and to Ewenty thouland Dounds, if it Determines the fame to One half of the fame Diffance; and that One Moictpo: Dalf partof fuch Remard of Sum Gall be Duc and Dato. toben the faid Commiffioners, of the major part of them, do Agree that any fuch Wethod extends to the Security of Ships, within Cighty Scographical Biles of the Shores, which are Places of the greaten Danger, and the other Boiety of Dalf-part, when a Ship by the Appointment of the faid Commiffionerg, of the major part of them, thall thereby naually Sail ober the Ocean, from Greit Britain to any fuch Post in the West-Indies, ag those Com. miffioners; of the major part of them, hall Choose of Rominate for the Experiment, without Louing their Longitude beyond the Limits before mentioned.
